The Day of Arafah, the 9th day of the 12th Islamic month of Dhu al-Hijja, is the climax of the annual Hajj pilgrimage. On this day, Hajj pilgrims gather on and around Mount Arafah, located to the Southeast of Mecca. There, they penitently call upon God, seeking His forgiveness and mercy and pardon. Muslims across the world also observe this day, likewise seeking God's forgiveness and immersing themselves in prayer and reflection. Fasting is recommended according to a Prophetic tradition. The Day of Arafah is followed by Eid al-Adha, the festival of Abraham's sacrifice, peace be upon him.

Date

- The Day of Arafah falls on the 9th day of the 12th and final month of the lunar Islamic Calendar and it is the day before the major Islamic holiday of Eid al-Adha.

Common Practices and Celebrations

- It is a holiday of prayer, fasting and repentance.

Common Dietary Restrictions

- Fasting is common but optional.
- Many Muslims follow halal food guidelines, meaning food that is permissible by Islamic standards.
- Vegetarian meals prepared without alcohol meet halal standards.

Impact to U-M Community

- Muslim colleagues and students may request to take the first day of the celebration off. Colleagues and remote students in Muslim countries will likely have a national holiday.
