Raksha Bandhan, known as Janai
Purnima in Nepal, is an annual Hindu
ritual highlighting the important bond
between brothers and sisters. It is
called the "Festival of Charm Tying"
because one of the central elements
is sisters tying a special charm or
amulet called a "rakhi" around the
wrist of their brothers to symbolically
ask them for protection. The brothers
also provide a small gift in turn. This
ritual has extended beyond blood
relations to include those that become
voluntary kin and accept a role as a
symbolic protector.

Date

- It takes place on the last day of Shraavana on the Hindu lunar calendar. This usually falls in August on the Gregorian calendar.
- Check the <u>Calendar Index</u> for Religious Holidays during the current academic year for the exact date.

Wishing someone a "Happy Raksha Bandhan," especially a brother or voluntary kin, is welcome.

Common Practices and Celebrations

 A charm or amulet is offered and tied around the wrist of the celebrant's brother or the person standing in as voluntary kin.

Common Dietary Restrictions

 Some Hindu practitioners adhere to a lactovegetarian diet which excludes meat, fish, and eggs.
